# **ACTIVITY: SHOW WHAT YOU KNOW**

# WHAT YOU NEED:

nothing!

## WHAT YOU DO:

Ask your kid to list a few categories of things they think they know a lot about. This could be Disney movies or characters, sports/famous athletes, math or science facts, types of insects—pretty much anything goes! Then pick a category and let someone go first naming something or someone in that category. The next person has to name something in that same category. Keep going without repeating anything, taking turns naming things in the category until someone can't quickly name something that hasn't already been said.

Choose a new category and keep playing! If someone names something or someone that no one else knows much about, let that person show what they know! (This is a great time for your kid to show off what they know and get an extra boost of confidence!)

You can end the game either by making the category "Facts about today's Bible story," or just read Luke 24:13-35 from the Bible to review the story.

# Talk about the Bible story:

- o What was the most important thing that the men on the road to Emmaus discovered? (Who Jesus is and that He is alive)
- o What's something that you discovered in this story?
- o Part of humility is about being willing and open to learning new things. What is one new thing you've learned recently? (Note: If it works/is appropriate for your family, engage your child in a discussion about what they can learn about themselves and your family through the COVID-19 pandemic.)
- o There's always more to discover about God's plan. How do we learn more about God and His plans for us? (By reading the Bible, asking questions, praying, talking about God with someone else who follows Him)

# **PRAYER**

Use this prayer as a guide, either after talking about the Bible story or sometime right before bed tonight:

"Dear God, thank You that we'll never stop learning more about You and Your plans for us. Life can get kind of scary sometimes. But we know that You are bigger than life's biggest struggles, and Your plans for us are good. Help us to always be ready to learn new things about You and about this life You've given us. In Jesus' name we pray, amen."

# **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- Why is it so hard for us to admit when we don't know something?
- If there's always more to discover about God, how do we do that? (Bible reading, prayer, mentor/wise person, application of what you're learning)
- How can you show humility when it comes to discovering new things?
- Have you ever had someone tell you or teach you something you already knew? How do you show humility in that kind of situation?
  - Is it okay to let others know that you already know something?



# Read Luke 24:13-35

As you read Luke 24:13-35, circle the paragraph where Jesus' followers try to explain to Jesus what had happened . . . well, to Jesus.

What important thing were the followers missing? (Hint: It's in the second part of verse 25.)

The two disciples were sad because they had missed a really important part of the story: Jesus' death was actually prophesied hundreds of years earlier, as was His resurrection! And in fact, this was Jesus standing in front of them right now!

But before Jesus was going to let them know who He was, first He took some time to explain exactly what the prophets had said, and how Jesus was the fulfillment of God's plan to save the world. Jesus wanted to make sure His followers discovered as much as they could about God and His plan!

Grab a sheet of paper and write at the top, "What have you discovered about God that surprised you?" Today,

you're going to interview a few different people in your life to see what they've learned about God. In the process, you'll probably discover something new too!

# As you decide who to interview, consider picking various people, including someone who:

- Has been following God for a long time
- Recently started following God

The disciples walking that road to Emmaus had no idea

Jesus was right there with them! How awesome to get to

talk to the very One who had come to be the Savior of the world. You can talk to Jesus too! Sure, it's not the same as having Him in the same room as you, but it's just as real and life-changing!

Ask a parent if you can go on a short walk outside. If that's not possible, just walk around your house. Keep your eyes open so you don't fall over something, but as you start out your walk, imagine you are the disciples, confused about what has happened and sad that Jesus has died, but also hopeful that maybe the story isn't over. Now imagine Jesus shows up and walks with you.

# As you continue walking, begin talking to Jesus. Start out by thanking Him for humbling Himself to come and die for you.

Then ask Him to reveal even more of Himself and His plan to you. Ask Jesus to help you live a life that is more like His, and to help you to grow "in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man" like He did. Pray about anything in your life that you need His help or wisdom with. Close your prayer by asking Him to surprise you today with a new truth about God!

- You think knows a lot about God

As they share with you what they've discovered about God, be sure and share with them something you've discovered too. Take the sheet of paper and put it somewhere you'll see the next few days. When you see it, take a minute to read and remember all the cool things you discovered about God by talking to others who follow Him.

# **HOW TO RAISE A JERK**

Most parents don't set out to raise kids who become jerks. But parenting kids who have a mind of their own can be confusing.

Some people say too many who work hard at building children's self-esteem are raising kids who will exhibit a lifestyle of entitlement and egotism. Other specialists say those who talk about children being innately bad are raising a generation that feels inferior and insignificant. Every expert has an opinion and it's hard to know where the line actually is. Many promote their agenda by pushing the opposing opinion to the extreme.

One of the keys to parenting with balance is helping your children develop an attitude of humility. Every child has the potential to grow up and understand why it's important to "put others first." There is just a fine line between raising kids who have a healthy self-esteem and kids who are too egotistical.

A life of arrogance that goes unchecked can result in a sad and lonely existence for someone, and frankly there are enough self-centered people around. How does someone develop an overinflated sense of self-worth and entitlement?

Here are a few ideas to help you unintentionally, but effectively, raise a jerk:

- Protect them from the consequences of their own mistakes.
- Make sure you do whatever they can do for themselves.

- Keep them away from anyone who thinks differently than they do.
- Try to give them everything they want.
- Tell them over and over again you just want them to be happy.
- Convince them that they are more special than other kids.
- Always take their side when they get in trouble with their teacher at school.
- Always take their side whenever they are in a conflict with a friend.
- Keep insisting that they are the best player on the team.
- Don't give them consistent opportunities to help or serve other people.
- Never require them to do chores.
- Reinforce their prejudices about people from different cultures or backgrounds.
- Make your relationship with them more important than your relationship with your spouse.
- Rarely express genuine gratitude to those who help you.
- Teach them to talk more than they listen.
- Never let them hear you say, "I was wrong. I am sorry."
